
We are brave, powerful warriors, and we will meet in battle!

This half term, we'll research Celtic and Roman warriors. Using different source materials we'll investigate the Roman Empire and read Roman numerals. For part of our work, we will design and make shields, as well as learning from a Roman Centurion how to march, defend and attack. We'll write texts about gladiators and create a menu for wealthy Romans after preparing a traditional Roman meal. Using maps, globes and information books, we'll compare Britain (the home of the Celts) and Rome (the home of the Romans).
